I look forward to seeing all you at our meeting and don't hesitate to call me or email me with anything you want to discuss.



Ham Ski Trip Adventures of Art WA2YQV and Elmar K2EL

Art and I took a ride up to Lake Placid to Ski Whiteface Mountain February 29th through March 3, 2004. Whiteface is about 400 miles north of NYC. Art took his truck and we had access to a condo in Lake Placid. On the way up we took a wrong turn and headed west on route 90 instead of going north on route 87 around Albany. We had to drive back down once we

discovered our mistake which took us about two hours out of the way. We monitored the two meter calling frequency and called "CQ" from time to time and made a simplex contact with Les Stay W2LES. We were corrected by Les who explained to us that merely a call sign is enough. I think it is still more fun to call CQ. The

contact lasted about an hour or even more where we talked about ham subjects and Les told us about his adventures in the Navy during WWII. Art and I were definitely intrigued by his stories and personality as well has his knowledge of ships. He had served on many islands in the Pacific with a construction battalion. Speaking with him was fun and helped pass the time on the road as we got to know Les on the air. He has quite a setup using a preamp with a vertical antenna up high enabling us to talk for quite a while. While heading north we lost his signal but told him we would be coming back his way Wednesday afternoon and to look out for us.

We skied Monday and Tuesday with very good conditions. Warm weather and soft snow made the skiing just that much more enjoyable. This was a rarity because in past years conditions were usually icy. Tuesday was rainy but we deiced to ski anyway hoping it would subside and it did. The mountain was empty which gave us even better skiing conditions that day.



I brought the "Rock-Mite" HOSARC kit project that I had built last year. Art set the wire antenna up over the

balcony as an inverted vee. (See photo). We both tried to make contact at night on 40 meters. We heard quite a few signals but due to the crowded band conditions and noise no one heard the half-watt Rock-Mite signal.



Just before packing up on Wednesday I tried one more time and made contact with W2UW, 3/3/04, 16:12 UTC, 559 sent, 559 received with QSB. Using a GPS and getting W2UW's coordinates I calculated the mileage to be 180 miles, which is pretty good for a half watt 40 meter radio. I have tried in the past to use the Rock-Mite at my home QTH in NYC but the QRM is just too strong from the Disney AM radio station. I still made a few local contacts in NYC. One of these days I will get around to building a filter circuit.



On the road back home we gave Les W2LES a call on two meter simplex when we approached his area. He came back to us so Art and I decided to invite him out to lunch. We met at Friendly's Restaurant on route 146 West just off exit 10 on the North-way. Les brought along his lovely wife Anna N2LGD and we all had a nice lunch together was well as a fine eyeball QSO. Les also insisted on picking up the tab citing it as "northern hospitality". So if your up around Albany be sure to give Les W2LES a call on two meter simplex.



Being a ham is being a member of a great fraternity where I have gotten many opportunities to meet interesting people this being just an example of one of them.

Maybe in the future some other hams would be interested in coming along to ski.
