
Nelson N2CKK and Joe KC2ITB at the Holiday Party...

Saint Helena consists of the islands of St. Helena, Ascension, and the island group of Tristan da Cunha. St. Helena is located in the South Atlantic Ocean, about midway between South America and Africa.

Discovered uninhabited by the Portuguese navigator Joao da Nova Castella in 1502, St. Helena was annexed by the Dutch in 1633. In 1659 it was annexed and occupied by the British East India Company, and in 1834 it became a British crown colony. The island served as a prison for South African Boers (Afrikaners) from 1900 to 1902. St. Helena is best known as the place of exile of Napolean I, who was sent there in 1815 and who died at Longwood, near Jamestown, in 1821. His home has been maintained as a memorial.
